A SHORT LENTEN REFLECTION

Chances are we all have heard of the word 'minimalism.' It is the thinking that as long as you do this or that, you will be fine. It shows up when some of the faithful push for a novena, or first Saturdays observance, wearing a scapular and say these would lead to sanctity and salvation—almost automatically.

Devotions and sacramentals can indeed lead us to salvation. But it is God who saves us; it is not we saving ourselves. Devotions and sacramentals are good and beneficial only as long as they lead to the deepening of our relationship with God.

The Pharisees, in the mind of our Lord, were guilty of this minimalism, this erroneous understanding.

They propounded ablutions for instance and equated this minimalist fulfillment as the prerequisite to the Law of Moses. They said that if every Jew would perform the Mosaic prescriptions, they were upright in the mind of God. By legalism, God's people would turn godly.

Jesus' disciples were criticized for eating without first washing their hands. (I'd always wash my hands before

grabbing a sandwich!) But he went deeper than mere ablutions. He said that there is evil in other forms such as uncharitable thoughts, wishing evil on someone, not helping others or ignoring needy people's dire circumstances.

There are times when we say, "As long as you do this, you'll be fine." At other times, we say "It's the least I can do." They are statements that indicate minimalism that needs to be corrected. Even the sentence, "I could have done more" is an admission of having fallen short in some way.

When it comes to being true disciples of Christ and following his teaching, less is definitely not more, not enough. The demands of charity and justice are limitless, not precise, tidy and manageable.

When we come face to face with God at the pearly gates, we cannot say there, "It was the least I could do." Yes, indeed, God is merciful. But knowing how much he loves us and realizing how much has given us, we could do better than doing the minimum. God's love as a matter of fact should ideally imbue every cell of our being!

Lent is here to invite us towards conversion, to renew our commitment and to make up for our slack or—yes—our minimalist discipleship.

Let us all be reminded about our own Confirmation and the importance of our continued study of the Faith; to become a sharper, more refined and knowledgeable soldier for God!



During the days of yore (way before my fourth day), the pro-life movement was not of any significance to me. What the mainstream media and their cohorts were espousing was what appeared logical at the time and thus it affected what my actions, beliefs and choices leaned upon. Fast forward 2011 - Even though an interior cultivation of all things pro-life was slowly being formed after my Cursillo weekend, my involvement with the pro-life movement did not pick up steam until a fellow Cursillista told me about it in 2015. One particular evening, after Holy Mass, that fellow Cursillista gave me a flyer

about the "40 Days for Life" (40FDL) Kick-Off Event at the Planned Parenthood (PPCV) site in Chula Vista. I was a little apprehensive, but I took the invitation. It was unknown territory but I ventured in, Rosary at hand. Ave Maria.

When the movie "Unplanned" was released this year, I was very surprised (in a good way). Soon, that feeling of surprise turned to concern when the MMPA gave the film an "R" rating, even though there was no profanity, no immodesty, no nudity and no suggestive elements in the film. I would later find out the significant digital marketing blockage Unplanned received from Big Tech upon its initial release. There is a sense of irony in giving an "R" rating to a Pro-Life movie and yet children/teens are free to seek out abortion. The dogma of mainstream media reared



its ugly head. Like clockwork, the community I belong to (Holy Martyrs) began planning to organize a movie event for the congregation and the public. Weeks later, the church was able to reserve in four theaters inside a very popular cinema house in the Temecula mall. All 1,500 theater seats were filled. The tickets were sold out in one week. The parish had also reserved the theater lobby for tables and booths for pro-life ministries. Those ministries provided information/assistance for attendees and mothers who were expecting or who have suffered through an abortion. A couple of the "Unplanned" producers were also present signing autographs and books for people. The parish also brought images of St. Michael, the Blessed Virgin Mary and other sacred statues around the theater. The Miles Christi religious order (in full cassock attire) was there doing confessions behind the theater concierge booth at the center of the lobby. It was amazing to see confession happening in plain sight for everyone to see, but with enough privacy for the penitent. That was a powerful

thing to witness. With four theater rooms filled with Catholics, non-Catholics, their invitees and guests via live video projection simultaneously on all four movie screens, our pastor started with an introduction and opening prayer. A layperson prayed and sang two hymns in latin, and had Catholic ministries provide pro-life information to the audience. When the movie ended, our parishioners were giving out long stem roses near the entrance of every theater room. The purpose for the roses are tied to the movie (if you haven't seen it, I won't spoil it for you. You'll just have to watch it). In short, all this work, tickets, took time, money and of course, prayers and spiritual warfare.

If even a poor schmuck like me can walk, pray, evangelize and participate in these events, you can too. We all have day/night jobs and circumstances, but we can still make a difference. We need to tip the scales, partake and inform other Catholics on how they can join the movement. Souls are on the line. According to the Pew Research Center [2018], 51% of Catholics say abortion should be legal - Let's change that through humility, fraternal correction, love, spiritual works of mercy, compassion, and being a witness to the truth. Continue your prayers, offer pro-life intentions (for the mothers, fathers and babies) when you are participating in the mass or in confession. Whether you start on the front lines or become a prayer warrior for the movement, be an advocate, protector and voice for the babies who do not have a voice.















PIP YOU KNOW?
